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### Hobie 16 Youth, Hobie Wave and Hobie 14 North Americans

41 competitors from all around the country came to the Sandy Hook to sail in the Hobie North Americans which was held from July 9th through July 12th. Sailors traveled from far away locations such as Seattle, California, Iowa, and Toronto. Sandy Hook Bay provided a marvelous 3 days of racing with our classic seabreeze kicking in early each day with winds ranging from 5 to 15 knots. Mark Modderman kicked off the event on Wednesday by teaching a clinic under the yurt on the beach for the 10 youth teams. Once the breeze filled in the youth teams headed out to get a little practice before racing started the next day. Most of the youth teams are able to compete in this event thanks to generous boat owners who loan their newer Hobie 16's to the youth teams for the event. In the fleet of 10 boats, six of the boats were loaned. In addition the Hobie Class Association provides youth grants for qualified teams to travel to the event. This is an amazing program that helps promote youth catamaran sailing.

Racing began Thursday with the 10 youth teams, 14 Hobie 14's and 7 Hobie Waves. The fleet of sailors included at least 5 North American Champions and as a result the racing was very close. Paraphrasing our race officer Mark Santorelli who said that "there must be some significance to the fact that 14 Hobie 14 sailors competed in the year 2014. the year that the inventor/promoter Hobie Alter passed on". If only we had scheduled the race to

finish 2 days later on July 14<sup>th</sup>, who knows what would have happened. Racing in the 14 fleet was very close. Fleet 250's own Mark Modderman held a narrow lead going into the last day of racing. Only 6 points separated 1<sup>st</sup> through 4<sup>th</sup> place between Nicolas Liebel(Canada), Dan Borg (Canada), Sue Korziniewski (Syracuse) and Mark Modderman. Sue took the lead in the first race of the day thanks to an unfortunate early start (OCS) for Mark. This became his throwout for the regatta and dumped him into 3<sup>rd</sup>. After the 2<sup>nd</sup> race of the day, only 2 point separated the four boats with Dan Borg lurking in 4<sup>th</sup>. Dan finished out the regatta with 3 bullets to take the overall title, his 2<sup>nd</sup> Hobie 14 Championship. For Dan Borg, in many ways, he was due to win on the last day. He had recently missed winning the Hobie 17 NA's two times in the last race of a regatta. Sue Korz ended up 2<sup>nd</sup>, only two points out of first, Mark in 3<sup>rd</sup> and Nicolas ended up 4<sup>th</sup> thanks to an unfortunate capsize in the last race. He found out the bay isn't that deep as evidenced by the black mud on the top of his nice white sail.

There was not as much drama in the other fleets. In the Wave fleet Jim Glanden won by 10 points winning 9 of the 13 races. An interesting battle was waged between Lynn Myers and Wally Myers, a multiple NA champ on the Hobie 16 and Hobie 17. Lynn threw down the hammer winning the first race of the regatta and beat Wally in 3 of the 4 races the first day. Wally was seen on the beach that night furiously tweeking his wave to gain an advantage the next day.

Wally clawed his way back and passed Lynn in the standing by the  $4^{th}$  race on Friday and won the last race of the day to lead Lynn by 3. Lynn wasn't going to back down and despite winning 2 of the 4 races on the last day, Wally edged her out for  $2^{nd}$  place by 2 points. Moving from the F18 to the Hobie Wave, Scott Rathburn missed his spinnaker and finished in  $4^{th}$  place.

In the youth fleet, Ben Brown (California) and Casey Larson (Iowa) took 1<sup>st</sup> place by a large margin. However, Ben had to work harder than the results show. After the first day he was tied with fleet 250's own Tom Butler and Emily Rathburn and lead changes were frequent. All of the other youth teams really mixed up the results with most every team getting finishes in the top 3 at some point in the regatta. Going into the last day, the

Kat Porter and Isabelle Strasser and the team of Ryan Flanigan and Ellis Kent stole away 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> respectively from Mike and Julia by putting up some smaller numbers that day.

The event not only had sailors from all over the country but also many volunteers were from various parts of the country. Twelve Hobie Class Association members and fifteen members from Fleet 250 combined to put together an event that will last in memory for a long time. In addition to the sailing, there were fun social events including a sightseeing tour of NYC aboard the Seastreak Ferry. For many people this was the first time they have seen NYC. Mark Brady served up many awesome meals for the regatta and everyone enjoyed the live music with dinner on Friday night.

### **Greg Raybon**



I had a great day sailing my Hobie Cat on Father's Day at SHBCC. But let me back up to tell the story.

My father was always an early adopter: he bought one of the first Baja Board windsurfers ever made after he saw it in *Popular Science* magazine in the late 60's, and he bought one of the first Hobie 16's ever made in the 70's. He then sold the 16 and upgraded to a brand-new Hobie 18 Magnum, the 1981 Cat Fever edition made for the Nationals with sail number 7526. With the wings, the boat was both comfortable & fast.

He sailed it pretty actively on Lake Lanier in Georgia and I enjoyed sailing on it with him in the 80's. Then my parents bought a J/22 keelboat and raced that boat in the 90's. The Hobie was in pieces down by the lake for years until my sister started to get interested in putting it together. She never completed the project and that's where I came in.

We live in Atlantic Highlands and have always known about SHBCC. We thought it would be fun to have the boat on the beach there. So I bought the replacement parts from my sister, rented a truck and drove all the parts up from Georgia. We needed a 26-foot truck to get the mast inside on the diagonal.

But with one step forward, I had to take two steps back and build a trailer so I could even move and store the boat. I bought a rusty old cat trailer that was not roadworthy, and I had to rent a trailer to even move that trailer! I went after it with an angle grinder and replaced all the rusted nuts & bolts with new hardware from Jaspan's. I then bought all new running gear (wheels, hubs, springs and axle) from Manny at Dosil's Trailer on Route 36. With other parts from West Marine, a few cans of Rustoleum spray paint and a home built registration from the state of Maine, the trailer is like new.


So then I turned to renovating the Hobie cat. I assembled the boat in my driveway, replacing parts as needed and checking everything for wear and tear. It was in surprisingly good shape since it was on a freshwater lake and there is little corrosion. I now have the assembly manual and parts diagram memorized, and spent many hours on Hobie forums and the Murray's Marine website. I even rigged the mast in my driveway (no overhead wires!) to make sure everything went together right.

My dad was interested to hear about the progress and I even sent him a funny Father's Day card. It was a photo of the boat being assembled with the caption "Thinking of You". We went down to SHBCC on Sunday June 15<sup>th</sup> with the hopes of sailing the boat for the first time. Fortunately it was a beautiful day with a nice light wind. We had plenty of help as we stepped the mast and learned how to use the beach wheels, which were new to us. We got the trailer settled into the beach spot to be a cradle for the boat, and felt welcomed as new members of the club.

My daughter Sydney, who has never been that crazy about sailing on other boats, was very interested to go out with me. My wife Corinna stayed ashore with our dog Dakota and shot some great photos.

After we came in from sailing, Sydney ran up to use the facilities and came back with a couple of grilled hamburgers. She was having fun and said "This club is great!"

So I had a fine day sailing my dad's Hobie 18 with my daughter on Father's Day. Since then I have been out many times and have even flown a hull in 20+ knots. The boat sails great and we are really enjoying the club and have met a lot of nice people. We hope to see you on the beach and on the water!
